

Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem

Palm Sunday falls before Easter, marking the first day of Holy Week. Everyone is called to participate in the Palm Sunday mass to remember, follow, and open our hearts to the Lord.

BAY ST. LOUIS—Palm Sunday is an early Christian ceremony commemorating Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. The ceremony began toward the end of the 4th century in Jerusalem. In the early years, it comprised two churches: the first hosted the mass and closed the ceremony, and the second blessed the palms. Following the Middle Ages, the Roman Catholic Church began to simplify the ceremony to emphasize Christ's sacrifice.

Today, the Catholic Palm Sunday masses include the blessing of the palms and the readings of the Passion of Christ. After the mass, the congregation may take home the palms as a sacramental sign throughout the week. Other churches, such as Anglican and Protestant, recognize Palm Sunday but may commemorate the ceremony differently. When the Easter season is over, many of the palms may be burned into ashes for the following year's Ash Wednesday masses.


Diocese of Biloxi Youth Conference 2024

Joseph was born and raised in Bethlehem, the city of David, and also descended from the royal line of King David. He later settled in Nazareth, where he met Mary, his future spouse. As it was a natural responsibility for a father to teach his son his trade, St. Joseph's father, Jacob, taught him how to be a carpenter. As a carpenter, he would lead a quiet, simple lifestyle.

Saint Joseph is the patron saint of families, fathers, expectant mothers, travelers, and craftsmen. These are very fitting since Joseph provided a safe home for the Holy Family (Mary, Jesus, and himself) to live in. The first St. Patrick's Day parade was recorded in 1601 in Florida. Another notable St. Patrick's Day parade was held in New York City in 1762 by Irish soldiers serving in the British army. These men marched to Irish music to reconnect to their Irish heritage. Parades like these became more prevalent and became a potent political symbol.

These parades showed strength in numbers during times of persecution of Irish- Catholic immigrants. Parades did not make it to Ireland until the 20th century, when they were held in Ireland's capital, Dublin.

Upcoming Cheer Tryouts

Are you interested in trying out for the 2024-2025 cheer season?

BAY ST. LOUIS- Tryouts will be held March 25th-27th. If you're in grades 6-11, you can try out and become a part of the cheer team. They will be hosted in the Brother Peter Gym. You can prepare for tryouts by doing daily stretches, tumbling, and jumping. On the first day of the clinic, you will be taught a cheer, chant, and dance. Everyone trying out will spread out and learn everything you need for tryouts. On the second day of tryouts, you will go over everything and have the chance to ask last-minute questions; then, you will be put into your assigned groups for the next day. You will end day two of the clinic by watching mock tryouts by the seniors. For tryouts, you should wear a fitted shirt that is either red, black, or white, hair out of your face, and cheer shoes. Then, when you arrive on the day of tryouts, you will be given your number. You will be placed with the group of girls you were with the day before. The doors will be closed on both sides of the gym, so nobody can see you trying out. When it's your turn, you will do a run-out. Then, the judges will ask to see your jump and then your second jump. The judge will then ask one of the 3 or 4 in the group to call the cheer. It will be called, and then, as a whole, you all will perform this cheer. The same thing happens again. The judge will ask someone in the group to call the chant. You will perform the chant. Then, the judge will give you a minute and ask you to prepare. When you're ready, he will say, Your music is



on. You will dance. Then, you will walk to the hard mat. Everyone will do their running tumbling. Then you leave the room. Although you're done with tryouts, you may not leave until everyone has tried out and everyone has finished trying out. You are free to go. The team will be posted that night on Instagram to see who made it. Typically, your first day of practice will be either a week or two weeks after tryouts.


History of Holy Thursday

BAY ST. LOUIS- Holy Thursday is a sacred day commemorating Christ's Last Supper and Washing of the Feet. It is not one of the six Holy Days of Obligation. Holy Thursday is sometimes called Maundy Thursday and is occasionally confused with the Solemnity of the Ascension. It falls between March 19 and April 22, and for Eastern Orthodox that follow the Julian calendar, it falls between April 1 and May 5.

During Holy Thursday, Jesus washes the feet of his followers before the Last Supper, announces Judas will betray him, celebrates the first Mass, and initiates the priesthood. Many believe the Easter Bunny tradition came from German immigrants, but the origin is unknown.

The Diocese of Biloxi's 46th Annual Rosary Rally is a hit with the locals!




Her favorite memories from OLA are from Mercy Day. During Ms. Hinson's free time, she enjoys being on the boat, being with her grandkids and mowing grass.

Rosa Parks Spotlight

In honor of Women's History Month, a famous woman of history was chosen for a spotlight.

BAY SAINT LOUIS - Rosa Parks is an amazing figure of women's history month. She helped initiate a civil rights movement by not giving up her seat on the Montgomery, Alabama bus for a white man. By doing this, Rosa became a huge part in inspiring the black community to start the Montgomery Bus Boycott. The Boycott lasted for more than a year and ended when the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that bus segregation was unconstitutional.

Rosa Parks is an African-American woman who was born in Tuskegee, Alabama, on February 4, 1913. She moved to Pine Level with her mom, Leona McCauley, and her dad, James McCauley, when she was 2. After her brother was born, in 1915, her parents split shortly after. Her mother, being a teacher, valued family education. Upon moving to Montgomery, Alabama, Rosa attended a high school, which was a laboratory at Alabama State Teachers' College. After graduating, Rosa cared for her sick grandmother and chronically ill mother. When Rosa was 19, She married Raymond Parks, who worked as a barber and was a long-time member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).

Rosa and Raymond became respectable members of Montgomery's large African-American community. Raymond had strongly discouraged her out of fear of her safety, Rosa joined the Montgomery chapter of the NAACP and became secretary. On December 1, 1955, Rosa Parks was arrested. She was arrested because she was told by the bus driver to give her seat up to a white man and said no. After being arrested, Rosa called her husband and E.D. Nixon were there when she was released on bail.

After seeing how courageous Rosa was, the black community started the Montgomery Bus Boycott. This formed the Montgomery Improvement Association (MIA) to manage the boycott. They elected Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. to be the President of the MIA. This boycott led to the black community being able to do the things we are able to do, today.

The Ides of March marks the day that Julius Caesar was assassinated.



Artist Spotlight: Artemisia Gentileschi

Celebrate Women's History Month by learning about a female artist!

BAY ST. LOUIS- Born in Rome in 1593 to painter Orazio Gentileschi, Artemisia quickly established herself as an



artist at age seventeen with her first signed painting in 1610, entitled *Susanne and the Elders*. She studied and practiced under her father and his friend Agostino Tessi and painted with the inspiration of Caravaggio whom her father followed in his revolutionary baroque art movement. In 1611, Tessi raped Artemisia, and her father did not bring him to trial until 1612 when Tessi refused to marry her. The trial lasted around five months, and although Tessi was found guilty and banished from Rome, his punishment was never enforced. Artemisia quickly picked herself back up and married a lesser-known artist from Florence. Florentine artist Pierantonio di Vincenzo Stiattesi and Artemisia settled in Florence and had five children together.

In 1616, Artemisia entered into Florence's Academy of Design, one of the

first women to do so. Her work while attending Florence's Academy was unlike many other women due to her

focus on history instead of still lifes and portraits. Some of her during this time include a self-portrait of herself as Saint
