HISTORY BEHIND BLACK HISTORY MONTH

BAY ST.LOUIS- February 1st marks the beginning of Black History Month, a time dedicated to honoring essential people and significant contributions and achievements of African **Americans throughout history.** The story of Black History Month begins in 1915, half a century after the Thirteenth Amendment abolished slavery in the United States. This month is not just a period of reflection but also an opportunity for people to understand, respect, and appreciate the rich cultural heritage and struggles of the African American community. Historian Carter G. Woodson first proposed Black History Month, "The Father of Black History," and the Association for Study of African American Life and History in 1926, initially as a week-long celebration. It was later expanded to a month in 1976 when President Gerald Ford recognized Black History Month and called upon the public of all Americans to "seize the opportunity to honor the toooften neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history." Since then, every U.S. president has officially marked

the month of February as Black History Month.
Black History Month lasts from February 1st to the 1st of March. Carter G.
Woodson chose the month of February as a time to honor Black History because it's a month when two men who played an essential role in shaping black history celebrate their birthdays in February.
President Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass are

known for their extreme efforts to end slavery. On February 1, 1865, President Abraham Lincoln signed the Thirteenth Amendment to the Constitution. The Thirteenth Amendment outlawed slavery in the United States. The Emancipation Proclamation was declared by Abraham Lincoln on January 1st, 1863, during the American Civil War, only freed slaves being held in Confederate states. The Emancipation Proclamation only became a national policy through the Thirteenth Amendment; Lincoln stated, "All to persons held as slaves" within the rebellious areas "Are, and henceforward shall be free. Frederick Douglass was a runaway slave who escaped to New York City in 1838; through his work with the Underground Railroad, it was estimated that Douglass and his wife helped at least 400 runaway slaves. After escaping, he later settled in Bedford, Massachusetts. In 1841, at an anti-slavery convention, he was asked to share his experience as an enslaved person; his story moved the audience so much that he became an agent for the Massachusetts Anti-Slavery Society.

In 1861, the nation got caught up in a war over the slavery issue. Frederick worked his best to prove that emancipation would be one of the outcomes of the war. He recruited African American men to fight in the U.S. Army, including two of his sons who served in the famous 54th Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry.


Alexis Barrois, an Our Lady Academy 2024 Senior, discusses her senior year and experience at OLA.

"Our Saint Pierre"

BAY ST. LOUIS- Pierre Toussaint was born into slavery in 1766 on the French island of Saint Domingue (Haiti). Most enslaved Africans were labored in the sugar cane fields, but Pierre was a domestic slave who provided comfort for Jacques and Marie Berard's family. He learned to read and write, and Jacques allowed curious Pierre access to his library. The uncertainty in Saint Domingue before and during the Haitian Revolution caused a majority of slave owners to depart with their slaves. The Berard family was one of the families who took flight to the U.S. In 1787, they brought five enslaved people, including Pierre and his sister, Rosalie, to New York City, searching for temporary refuge. Jacques returned to Saint Domingue to attempt to





"I have never felt I am a slave to any man or woman but I am a servant of Almighty God who made us all. When one of His children is in need, I am glad to be His slave." check on his property but died there, leaving Marie widowed in New York. Pierre was apprenticed to work as a hairdresser, but as a young man, he grew highly proficient and in high demand. He made enough money to take care of his widowed mistress, Marie; he even purchased the freedom of other slaves, including his future wife, Juliette Noel, a Haitian woman. Pierre purchased a house in Manhattan.

In 1811, he married Juliette. Pierre also made enough money to purchase his sister's freedom and adopt her daughter, Euphemia, after her mother's death. The Toussaint family was devastated because of Euphemia's death at the age of fourteen due to tuberculosis. As a devoted Catholic, Pierre and his family always attended St. Peter's Church, which later became St. Patrick's Cathedral. Pierre was highly charitable throughout his life towards Church the and other institutions. The Toussaint family offered their home to orphan children, whom they educated and taught. Pierre and Juliette were large benefactors to the First New York City Catholic School for African American children and the Oblate Sisters of Providence, a Catholic school in Baltimore established to educate African

American girls. Pierre and his wife never stopped working their best to help others until Juliette died in 1851.

Pierre died two years later, a freeman in New York in 1853. He was buried next to his wife and Euphemia in St. Patrick's Old Cathedral cemetery. In December 1996, Pope John Paul II recognized the life of Pierre; the Pope declared him the Venerable Pierre Toussaint as part of the canonization process. This firmly placed him on the road to becoming North America's first African American saint; Pierre was a proud man in his faith and culture, committed to serving others. During his lifetime, people referred to him as "our Saint Pierre."

With the school testing day for the ACT quickly approaching, here are classes and courses you can take to improve your score.

BAY ST. LOUIS - On March 13, Our Lady Academy's juniors and sophomores will take the ACT. For juniors, this is not their first rodeo. However, this may be the first ACT for many sophomores! Many students take ACT prep courses online and in person to improve their scores. The issue with online prep courses is that most students require a course



personalized to their needs and one-on-one with their instructor. The problem with in-person classes is they can be hard to locate, but this article can help!


This article will discuss the Pearl River ACT Prep course, The Literacy Lady, and personal ACT tutors. Although many of these courses will not be

available before this ACT, they can be used to prepare students for their next testing day.

The Pearl River ACT Prep course will be offered on May 30, 2024, at the Pearl River Community College Poplarville Campus, and the application deadline is May 23. The course costs 85 dollars to attend, and lunch is provided. The instructor is Dr. Jennifer Seal. To apply for this, look up PRCC ACT Prep and follow the link to their page; a hotlink will be provided to register online.

Another option to prepare for the ACT is to sign up for a class with The Literacy Lady, Carva King. Mrs. King offers in-person instruction at her learning studio in Long Beach and has an online class. Once the student completes their initial workshop in person or online, they will continue practicing the techniques they learned and receive feedback from Mrs. King. The cost for this course is 150 dollars per student.

Another option is hiring a personal tutor to coach you on improving your ACT score. According to Thumbtack, a tutoring website, the best ACT tutors on the coast are SoFlo Test Prep, which charges 75 dollars per hour; Amikka Test Prep, which charges 60 dollars per hour; and Mireille Levy, which charges 105. When preparing for the ACT, don't be afraid to spend a little time and money to devise a strategy; it may just improve your grade!

Mrs. Seymour's husband took a similar route, first being a teacher, then moving to administration, then back to teaching, and also picking up coaching. She has two sons and a daughter.



Hot Reads!



Reading is one of many ways to occupy free time in class. Look at some popular books you can find here on campus in Mrs. Colbert's room to read!





Ash Wednesday marks Catholics' first day of Lent and falls 40 days before Easter. Each represents both the death and repentance of the individual who receives them.

BAY ST. LOUIS- Ash Wednesday is a well-known Christian tradition that began in the early churches of Rome. On Ash Wednesday, many Christians partake in a morning, afternoon, or evening mass to receive their ashes. During the mass, the priest places the ashes on the recipient's forehead in the shape of the cross, saying, "Remember you are dust, and from dust, you shall return."

These ashes are obtained by burning the palms previously used at the Palm Sunday mass. Although Ash Wednesday is not a holy day of obligation, every Christian must receive their ashes to remember their death and penance.

Ash Wednesday is held throughout many churches. These churches include Roman Catholic, Protestant, Anglican, and Lutheran. This celebration marks the beginning of Lent, a 40-day fasting period of prayer, almsgiving, and personal sacrifices to symbolize Jesus's journey in the desert. Lent requires that all Roman Catholics eat only one full meal daily and refrain from consuming meat on Fridays. These 40 days of Lent prepare Christians for the Easter season.

St. Patrick's Day




